### SCHOOL BACKGROUND

Christian Academy of Louisville Southwest is a member of the Christian Academy School System, which serves almost 3,000 students on four campuses with a commitment to traditional education in a Christ-centered environment. The System began with the founding of Christian Academy of Louisville in 1976 with 120 students, and steadily grew to nearly 2,000 students in Preschool through 12th grade on two campuses - English Station (located in Middletown) and Rock Creek (located in St. Matthews). In 2000, the System expanded with the addition of Christian Academy of Louisville Southwest campus in Shively. Southwest now serves over 200 students in Preschool through 8th grade. Finally, 2005 saw the opening of Christian Academy of Indiana in New Albany, which serves over 700 students in Preschool through 12th grade. Today, Christian Academy is proud to have nearly 2,400 graduates across the country and throughout the world serving as leaders in their homes, churches, businesses and communities.

## Curriculum

## Special Areas

All students participate in six special areas each week consisting of Art, Music, Library, Computer, Physical Education and Spanish.

## Elementary Athletics
